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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to aid CALS Transfer students in a successful transition to the University of Florida, specifically tailored to the resources and opportunities in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. This course aims to help students understand the four core values in CALS: Diversity, Collaboration, Service, and Integrity; through a series of seminars, workshops, and guest presentations. *Connecting with CALS* is offered to provide a foundation for a well-rounded college experience, connect students to CALS, UF/IFAS Research and Extension resources, and promote engagement in and outside of the classroom.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Educate new transfer students to maximize their learning and development. As a result of taking this course, students will be able to:

- Connect with faculty, staff, and peers in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.
- Identify CALS, IFAS and UF resources and services that contribute to personal and educational goals.
- Identify the purpose of reflection and critical thinking.
- Identify educational enrichment opportunities in and outside the classroom.
- Evaluate the effects of personal well-being on student success and engagement.
- Recognize the academic, conduct, and citizenship expectations of the University of Florida and CALS.

- Develop an awareness of and respect for being a part of a diverse global community.

CANVAS

Students are expected to utilize the online course delivery system, Canvas, on a regular basis. All grades, course communication and announcements will be posted in this venue. Assignments, when applicable, will be submitted in Canvas.

ATTENDANCE

Given the importance of class discussion and participation in demonstrations and exercises, it is not possible for a student to perform satisfactorily in the course without regular attendance. Students are required to attend class and to be in class on time. Students are always responsible for making up excused work in a timely manner. Students who are repeatedly absent, even with a doctor's excuse, will find it difficult to succeed in this course. (NOTE: A note from the Student Health Care Center is not considered an "official" excuse.) A student's grades will be lowered if they repeatedly miss class or are habitually late. Tardy arrivals (anything after five minutes after class starts) are counted the same as absences.
